CPC Monthly Traffic Report – September 2026

Fatal Collision Traffic Stats

There were five reportable fatal collisions in August bringing the YTD fatal collision count to 21 and number of fatalities (number of people killed) to 25. There were no fatal pedestrian collisions in August keeping pedestrian count to six. Unsafe or excessive speed has been identified as a contributing factor in nine fatal collisions. Alcohol or drugs are also suspected to have played a role in three collisions. The increased fatality count in August was a quadruple fatality collision on Tsuut'ina Tr SW where four people were killed. Excessive speed and impairment were identified as factors in this collision.

Monthly Traffic Focus for August: New Drivers

August's Traffic Safety Focus was New Drivers. During the month of August, CPS issued 340 tickets under three charge sections of the Traffic Safety Act- 51(A) Operate MV Without Holding Drivers License, 51(B) Operate MV Without Proper Class, 51(E) Learner Drive Without Proper Supervision. Monthly count registers on par with the 5yr average.

Operation ERASE YYC

Between April and August, 2026, and as a response to street racing, Operation ERASE YYC was implemented by the Traffic Section with multiple internal and external supporting partners including high-visibility deployment focused on suppression, disruption, and enforcement. Operation ERASE YYC resulted in 445 summons related to street racing.

CPS Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance (CVSA) Stats

- This month, CPS inspected a total of 44 vehicles, of which 40 were placed out of service (OOS), resulting in an OOS rate of 91%. Year-to-date, 340 vehicles have been inspected, with an OOS rate of 91%.
- Combined Sheriff Highway Patrol and partnering agencies inspected a total of 38 vehicles, of which 23 were placed OOS, resulting in an OOS rate of 60%. Year-to-date, 355 vehicles have been inspected, with an OOS rate of 52%.
- Two Joint Forces Operation were conducted in August resulting in 22 summonses issued bringing the year-to-date total to 285.

26381567	32 Av & Crowchild Tr NW	A man was driving on Crowchild Trail N.W. when he suddenly slowed near 32 Avenue N.W., and his vehicle was rear-ended by another vehicle. The man was transported to hospital and died one week later. Speed and impairment are not believed to be factors.
26389004	McKnight Bv & Metis Tr NE	A motorcyclist was killed when he lost control of his motorcycle along McKnight Boulevard N.E. and was thrown from the bike. Speed is believed to be a factor. Impairment is not believed to be a factor.
26391508	7200 Bowness Rd NW	A vehicle was travelling along Bowness Road N.W., when it crossed the centre line and collided head-on with a City of Calgary transit bus. The vehicle driver was taken to the hospital and died several days later. Speed and impairment are not believed to be factors.



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In the Community

DOWNTOWN SAFETY UPDATES

Safer Calgary - Operation Restore

Throughout the summer months, patrol, the Community Engagement Response Teams (CERT) and the Downtown Street Engagement Teams (DSET) continued to partner with various units across the service, Calgary Community Standards (Bylaw) and Transit peace officers targeting crime and social disorder in the downtown core. The primary objective of these efforts is to deliver a coordinated, high visibility police and peace officer presence and direct law enforcement response to areas of community concern in the East Village and on Stephen Avenue. In August 2026, Operation Restore also expanded to include the Beltline.

***ALL CERT teams were redeployed to the Parker Missing Child search and investigation the week of August 4th, and then to the active shooter in Edworthy Park on August 10, 2026.

District 1 Warrant Roundup

On Aug. 5-6, 2026, CERT and DSET members assigned to Operation Restore partnered with the Alberta Sheriffs' Fugitive Apprehension Sheriffs Support Team (FASST) for a two-day warrant roundup in downtown and the surrounding area. Eighteen offenders were arrested, 91 arrest warrants were executed and \$3,000 in fines were collected. Warrants included the following offences: Assault Peace Officer, Resist Arrest, Possess Dangerous Weapon, Hazardous Storage of Firearm, Breach of Probation, Fail to Attend, Fail to Comply. On August 6, arrests were coordinated with three additional offenders, with a further 25 warrants executed as a result.

Operation Restore Quick Stats

The numbers below reflect overall totals from the operation up to the end of August and are inclusive of enforcement actions from the Calgary Police Service and our partner agencies.

- Charges laid: 168
- Summonses issued: 2,374
- Warrants executed: 2,729
- Proactive community engagements: 1,723
- Social support referrals: 2,964

The District 1 Community Resource Officers as well as patrol officers have documented solicited and overheard feedback from community members and businesses in East Village and Stephen Avenue. Community and business feedback indicates that Operation Restore is improving perceptions of safety, reducing visible disorder, strengthening relationships between police and local businesses, and creating a more positive environment for customers, employees, and visitors in the East Village and Stephen Avenue corridors.



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- **Increased police visibility** providing a stronger sense of safety and security for staff, customers, and visitors.
- **Enhanced engagement with businesses**, with officers regularly connecting with staff and building relationships.
- **Faster police response times** in the Stephen Avenue and East Village areas.
- **Reduction in social disorder and associated concerns**, improving the overall environment for businesses and patrons.
- **Improved confidence among business owners and employees** due to the consistent police presence.
- **Stronger partnerships between CPS, businesses, and private security**, leading to better information sharing and coordination.
- **A more welcoming atmosphere for customers**, supporting business activity and foot traffic in the area.
- **Positive community perception**, with businesses recognizing the value of continued enforcement and community-focused policing efforts.

Displacement from Operation Restore

Several locations with the operational deployment areas experienced decreases in disorder while adjacent areas experienced increases due to displacement. The most notable increases were around the CORE Shopping Centre area, Downtown west end, southwest Beltline, Bridgeland, Crescent Heights and Sunnyside. Overall, the analysis suggests disorder actively largely remained within established downtown and adjacent area corridors with evidence of short distance redistribution rather than significant geographic displacement. There have been 141 encampments located up to August 31 in the East Village and Stephen Avenue deployment areas with reported increases in and around the Salvation Army Centre of Hope and Central Library locations, the Music Pavilion northwest of The Confluence and Pixel Park. These encampment areas generally correspond with areas demonstrating increased disorder-related calls for service.

District 3 Warrant Roundup

In partnership with the Fugitive Apprehension Sheriffs Support Team (FASST), District 3 conducted Operation Warrant Roundup on May 20 and 21, 2026. The initiative supported the CPS Warrant Project, which aims to reduce outstanding warrants, prevent further offending, improve public safety, and mitigate legal, financial, and reputational risks to CPS. Four joint CPS and Sheriff teams conducted targeted enforcement across District 3, focusing on both criminal and non-criminal warrants. Administrative support ensured accurate tracking, reporting, and processing of arrests and warrant executions throughout the operation.

During the two-day operation, officers reviewed 118 wanted targets, checked 75 addresses, and arrested nine offenders. A total of 42 warrants were executed, including 30 for criminal offences such as break and enter, fraud, drug trafficking, and various failures to comply with court orders, as well as 12 non-criminal warrants related to offences such as driving without insurance, trespassing, and bylaw infractions. Investigators also developed actionable intelligence on 16 additional targets for future enforcement efforts, and approximately \$3,000 in outstanding fines



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was recovered. The operation demonstrated the value of coordinated enforcement and intelligence-led warrant management in addressing outstanding offenders within the community.

District 3 Warrant Roundup Quick Stats

- 118 wanted targets assigned across four enforcement teams.
- 75 addresses were checked over the two-day operation.
- 42 offenders arrested on outstanding warrants.
- 42 warrants executed.
- 30 criminal warrants for offences ranging from Break and Enter to Fail to Attend Court.
- 12 non-criminal warrants for offences ranging from Driving without Insurance to Transit By-law offences.
- 16 additional targets generated actionable intelligence, including updated addresses for future follow-up.
- \$3,000 in outstanding fines was collected.

This work demonstrated the effectiveness of the CPS-Alberta Sheriffs partnership in locating wanted persons, executing warrants, gathering intelligence, and reducing operational, legal, and public safety risks associated with outstanding warrants.

Keeping the City Safe During Stampede – Glimpse into a 48 Hour Window

Between July 7 and 8, South Division patrol members responded to several significant operational events within a 48-hour period while continuing to maintain a strong community presence through Stampede-related engagement activities.

District 2 – Aggravated Assault/Stabbing

A serious stabbing near the Sunalta LRT resulted in a suspect being rapidly identified, arrested, and charged with aggravated assault, weapons offences, identity fraud, obstruction, and multiple release order breaches. The accused was also found to be the subject of a Canada-wide immigration warrant and has been remanded into custody pending further proceedings with Canada Border Service Agency (CBSA) involvement. The investigation reflects strong collaboration between patrol, the General Investigations Unit (GIU), Arrest Processing Section (APS), Forensic Crime Scene Unit (FCSU), and CBSA. Offender is currently in custody, and the charges are still before the courts.

District 2 – Overnight Stabbing

In a separate stabbing several hours later, patrol members provided immediate life-saving care to a victim suffering critical injuries, including wounds requiring emergency heart surgery. Extensive patrol, Canine, HAWCS, and investigative resources were deployed. The victim is recovering, the investigation remains active, and GIU has assumed carriage. Offender is currently in custody, and the charges are still before the courts.



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DOT Enforcement Success

District 8 District Operations Team (DOT) members supporting a property crime investigation located a stolen vehicle connected to a break-and-enter, resulting in the arrest of two prolific offenders. The investigation addressed numerous outstanding criminal and traffic warrants, release condition breaches, and possession of stolen property offences, demonstrating effective proactive offender management and strong coordination with District 8, District 1 patrol and HAWCS.

Community Engagement

District 8 CRO members attended two large Stampede breakfast events in Quarry Park and Evergreen, engaging approximately 3,800 residents. Members provided crime prevention information, answered community concerns, promoted recruiting, and strengthened relationships with residents, elected officials, and community partners. Feedback was overwhelmingly positive and further reinforced CPS visibility and public confidence during Stampede week.





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June & July 2026 Investigative Updates of Note

Attempted Murder Investigation – Calgary high school

In June, Lester B Pearson High School was placed in lockdown after multiple callers reported that a youth armed with a knife was smashing property, threatening students and staff and had attempted to stab a student. It is believed the attack was premeditated, resulting in charges of attempted murder, uttering threats and mischief to property. The offender remains in custody with court scheduled for September 21, 2026.

Landlord Voyeurism

In early June, a tenant of a rental property in southwest Calgary noticed a small hidden camera placed on a surge protector device located in the bathroom, as well as a hidden camera found on a smoke detector in their bedroom. The tenant notified other tenants who found similar hidden cameras in their respective bedrooms and then notified police.

Later that same week, on Friday, June 12, 2026, investigators executed a search warrant at another southwest Calgary address and seized multiple electronic storage devices. It is believed the landlord installed similar devices at another rental property located in the northwest community of Brentwood.

On Friday, July 10, 2026, the landlord was arrested. He has been charged with one count of break and enter and five counts of voyeurism. He is currently out on bail pending his court date on October 9, 2026.

Violent Downtown Stabbing

On June 10, 2026, police were called to the area of Seventh Avenue and Fourth Street S.E. for reports of a man who had been stabbed. Police were able to quickly identify, locate and arrest the suspect. a residence. The victim was transported to hospital in serious condition and was later upgraded to stable. The offender was charged with one count each of aggravated assault and possession of dangerous weapon and remains in custody with court scheduled for February 24, 2027.

Robbery and Assault of Senior

On July 11, 2026, a 75-year-old woman was walking from her vehicle to her apartment, located in the 6200 block of 17 Avenue S.E., when she was approached by two unknown males who attempted to steal her purse. The victim fought back and screamed for help, attracting the attention of a neighbour who intervened. The males fled the area before police arrived. The victim was treated in hospital for minor injuries.

Investigators collected CCTV from the area and through a review of the footage, witness interviews and a comparison of evidence from a previous robbery, two youth suspects were identified.

In late July, investigators obtained judicial authorization for two residences. A 14-year-old male and a 16-year-old male have each been charged with one count of robbery.



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During the investigation, clothing matches led to the identification of one of the offenders being involved in separate unrelated Facebook Marketplace robbery.

One offender remains in custody with a court appearance scheduled September 18, 2026. The other offender is currently out on bail, with a pending court date on September 16, 2026.

Personal Robbery and Assault

On the evening of June 23, 2026, a female victim reported that her purse had been stolen from a southwest Calgary pub. The woman reported that after observing her purse in the possession of a man and woman in a nearby parking lot, she confronted them regarding the theft. When the victim began recording the suspect's vehicle, the man deployed bear spray, took the victim's phone and fled the scene.

A short time later, officers located the victim's phone near the Bow River, beneath the 10th Street Bridge. CCTV footage obtained from the pub and a Liquor Depot, where the victim's stolen credit cards were later used, led investigators to identify two well-known prolific offenders. Investigators circulated an image to our law enforcement partners in an effort to identify the suspects, and the following day the Airdrie RCMP recognized both offenders when they fled from a traffic stop. The offenders drove at speeds exceeding 200 km/h into oncoming traffic before abandoning the vehicle and fleeing on foot. One offender was taken into custody, and warrants were subsequently obtained for the arrest of the second offender.

The male offender was charged with theft under \$5000, robbery and breach of probation. The offender was bound by an electronic monitoring system that he had torn off. He was remanded into custody at the Calgary Remand Center but is now out on bail until his trial on June 28, 2027. The female has been charged with theft under \$5000 and robbery and is currently out on bail with a pending court date of September 17, 2026.

Significant Property Crime Operation Disrupted

In late June 2026, the Auto Theft Team recovered a stolen vehicle at a residence in Hawkwood, leading the District 7 Operations Team to uncover a significant property crime operation involving stolen construction equipment and fraudulent identification documents. A subsequent search warrant resulted in the recovery of approximately \$100,000 in stolen construction equipment linked to multiple construction site break and enters across Calgary, along with the seizure of more than 80 government-issued licences and identification cards believed to have been used to fraudulently obtain rental vehicles for the commission of additional property crimes. Through surveillance, CCTV evidence, and other investigative techniques, a man was identified as the primary suspect. The investigation resulted in the arrest of three offenders, the disruption of a significant property crime operation, the recovery of substantial stolen assets, and the generation of further investigative leads related to additional property offences.

Three offenders were charged. One was charged with break and enter and commit and possession of stolen property over \$5,000 and the second was charged with possession of stolen property over \$5,000. Both offenders have been released on an undertaking with court



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appearances scheduled for October 2026. The third was arrested on more than 20 outstanding warrants and remains in custody with a pending court date of October 1, 2026.



Firearms and drug trafficking investigation

In June 2026, investigators received information that a man was involved in drug trafficking and was in possession of a firearm. Following further investigation, officers obtained a search warrant for a residence located in the 300 block of First Avenue N.E., which was believed to be associated with the suspect.

A search of the residence uncovered ammunition, quantities of fentanyl, cocaine, and methamphetamine, \$7,819 in cash, and evidence consistent with drug trafficking. During the arrest, a suspect was believed to have discarded a firearm before being taken into custody. The first offender faces multiple firearms, weapons, and proceeds of crime charges and remains in custody pending his next court date. The second offender was charged with possession of ammunition contrary to a prohibition order and failure to comply with a release order and is out on bail with court date pending on September 16, 2026.



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Community Problem Address - South Calgary (Community North Glenmore Park)

Police initiated an operation in response to several neighbourhood complaints regarding suspected drug activity and property crime related to a residence on Lissington Drive S.W. Over the course of several weeks Calgary Police, in partnership with Safer Communities & Neighborhoods (SCAN) observed activity consistent with drug trafficking which led to a search warrant on the property. During the search warrant police located two stolen vehicles, various drug substances with a total street value of \$9498, and stolen property. One offender was present at the time of the warrant and was arrested and transported to APS where he was charged with seven counts of Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking under the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act, along with seven outstanding unendorsed criminal warrants. He has since been released on bail with a court date scheduled for October. The two other offenders who were not present were bound by court ordered curfews and were each charged with Breach of Release Orders. Warrants were issued for their arrest.

Members of the public shared their appreciation with CPS during the search warrant for addressing a major neighborhood concern.

August 2026 Investigative Updates of Note

High Value Break and Enter Investigation and Recovery of Property

At the end of July, officers responded to a commercial break and enter and discovered that two suspects had gained access to a fenced yard and stolen approximately \$100,000 worth of specialized electrical equipment. During the subsequent investigation, officers identified two individuals believed to be connected to several property-related offences, including this incident. On August 18, 2026, investigators executed a search warrant at an address associated with the suspects, recovering a stolen vehicle and numerous items of suspected stolen property. As a



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result of the investigation, more than \$30,000 worth of stolen property was recovered and returned to the affected businesses.

The first offender was charged with multiple break and enter offences, possession of stolen property, mischief, and traffic-related offences, including operating an uninsured vehicle. The second offender was jointly charged in the break and enter and stolen vehicle offences, as well as driving while prohibited, operating an uninsured vehicle, and had four outstanding warrants executed. Both offenders were released on bail pending their next appearance in court.

Proactive Policing Nets Auto Theft Offenders

On August 4, 2026, District 5 Operation Team members were proactively deploying in the vicinity of a N.E. community problem address when they observed three people entering a stolen Chevy Silverado truck parked nearby. Uniformed patrol officers were engaged to conduct a traffic stop; however, the vehicle fled the area. The vehicle was located a short time later having been dumped behind another address with the offenders fleeing. All three suspects were located by K9 and patrol members a short distance away and taken into custody.

The first offender was charged with possession of stolen property, two counts of failing to comply with an undertaking, and criminal flight. He is currently in custody pending his next court appearance on September 16, 2026. The second offender was charged with three counts of breaching a firearms prohibition order. She was released on bail with a next court appearance on September 23, 2026. The third person was released without charge due to there being no grounds for arrest.

C-Train Aggression and Shooting Incident

On August 1, 2026, officers were called to the Victoria Park/Stampede LRT station for reports of a shooting. Upon arrival, two victims were located suffering from what appeared to be gunshot wounds. It is believed an altercation occurred on the C-Train between three men. When the train reached the station, the three men disembarked, and one man produced a pistol and shot the two other men. The offender then fled the scene.

The victims were transported to hospital, one in stable condition and one in life-threatening condition. The man in life-threatening condition has since been upgraded to stable. Responding officers circulated the area and quickly took the offender into custody nearby.

The offender was charged with two counts of aggravated assault, firearms-related offences, and multiple weapons prohibition violations. He remains in custody until his next court appearance scheduled for September 21, 2026.

Kidnapping and Carjacking

During the early morning hours of August 18, 2026, patrol members responded after a victim was located near Balzac after flagging down a passing motorist. The man reported he had been walking his dog around Lucas Park in northwest Calgary just after midnight when he was approached by an unknown male who produced a knife and demanded his keys. Two additional



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suspects then assisted in forcing the victim into the vehicle, where he was confined in the trunk of a car for a brief time before being released near Balzac with minor injuries.

The District 4 General Investigations Unit was engaged and, utilizing technology, identified the vehicle as being in the northeast community of Rundle. They observed it being driven out of Calgary at a high rate of speed, and with the assistance of HAWCS and the RCMP, followed it to Innisfail, where the driver pulled into a parking lot. Three suspects were arrested and two children located in the vehicle were safely apprehended. The coordinated response resulted in the successful recovery of the vehicle, the arrest of all involved suspects, and a positive resolution to a serious incident.

Two offenders are currently in custody pending their next court appearances on September 16 and 17, 2026. The third offender was released on bail with a next scheduled court appearance of September 18, 2026.

Proactive LRT Initiatives

Members of the District 8 Community Resource Officers and Patrol were conducting an early morning proactive deployment at the Somerset-Bridlewood LRT Station when they were approached by a victim suffering facial injuries. The victim reported that a male offender had been aggressively confronting an Asian female on the platform while shouting racial slurs and had subsequently assaulted the victim before fleeing eastbound. Officers immediately observed a suspect matching the description running from the area and initiated a coordinated response.

Officers pursued the offender on foot while additional units quickly established containment in the Shawnessy area. During the incident, information was received that the suspect may have been in possession of a firearm, prompting a significant police response and strategic area containment. Throughout the search, Transit partners provided timely and valuable information that assisted officers in focusing their efforts and confirming the suspect had not re-entered the CTrain system.

Despite attempts by the offender to evade detection by changing his clothing, police ultimately located the suspect inside a Shawnessy Walmart. The offender was positively identified and arrested without incident. Officers subsequently recovered clothing believed to have been worn during the offence.

The offender is known to police and has a documented history of violent, unprovoked assaults against members of the public, as well as previous hostile interactions with law enforcement.

As a result of the arrest, two new criminal charges were laid, and 11 outstanding warrants were executed. He remains in custody pending his next court date on September 25, 2026.

Simultaneously, the District Commander and a CRO member were conducting a separate proactive patrol in the Shawnessy area. During this deployment, they identified an individual who was found to be wanted on 13 outstanding warrants, including criminal and bylaw matters, as well as multiple failures to appear. The individual is a High System User with a history of non-compliance with Judicial system and has psychotic episodes.



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Both individuals were transported to the Arrest Processing Unit and remain in custody pending their next court appearances.

Operation D8 Carmine

Operation D8 Carmine was initiated in June 2026 after information from a Drug Investigations for Safer Communities investigator linked a male suspect to two overdose death investigations. Between June and August 2026, the District 8 Operations Team conducted an investigation and obtained search warrants for the suspect's Auburn Bay residence and a secondary location in McKenzie Lake.

On August 31, 2026, the offender was arrested for Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking. During the operation, a female offender was also arrested after investigators observed her removing items from the first offender's residence and subsequently located suspected drugs, packaging materials, and scales in her vehicle. Searches of the associated locations resulted in the seizure of approximately 2 kilograms of cocaine, 593 codeine pills, 570 grams of psilocybin, 208 grams of methamphetamine, 49 tabs of LSD, morphine and Adderall pills, 6,200 contraband cigarettes, and \$46,640 CAD in cash.

Investigators also seized scales, packaging materials, a vacuum sealer, electronics, and other evidence consistent with drug trafficking. Additionally, three firearms and approximately 11 kilograms of unidentified powder were recovered, with further charges pending the completion of forensic analysis. The operation successfully disrupted a significant drug trafficking operation, resulted in the arrest of two offenders, and removed substantial quantities of drugs, firearms, and suspected proceeds of crime from the community.

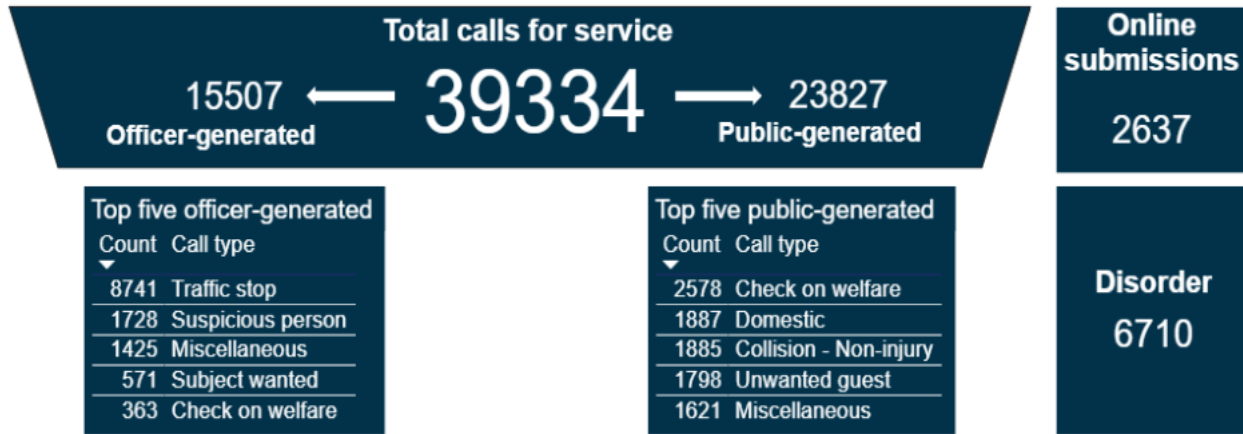
The first offender is currently in custody pending his next court date on September 26, 2026. The second offender was released on bail with a next court appearance scheduled for September 16, 2026.





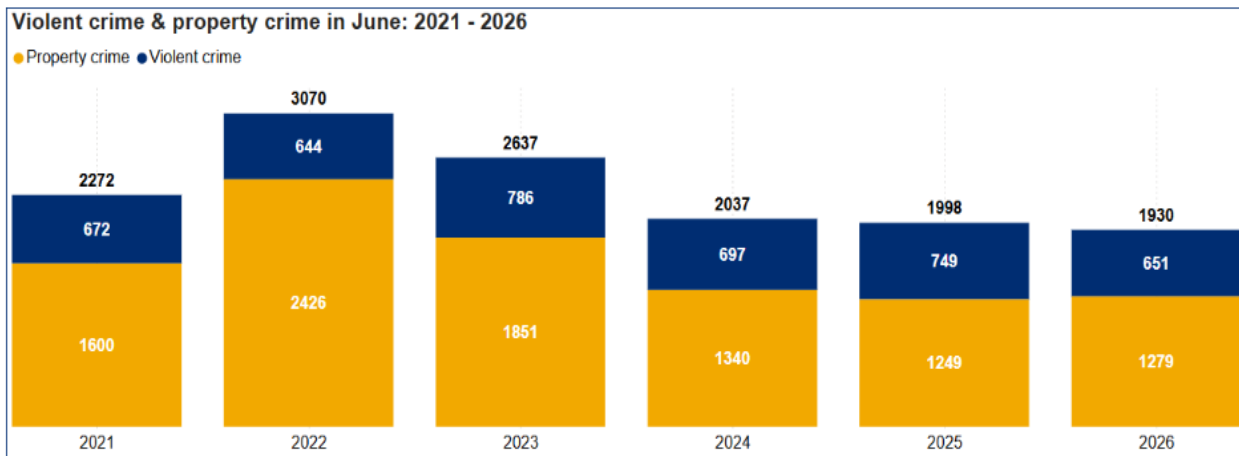

June Five-Year Average 2021 – 2026



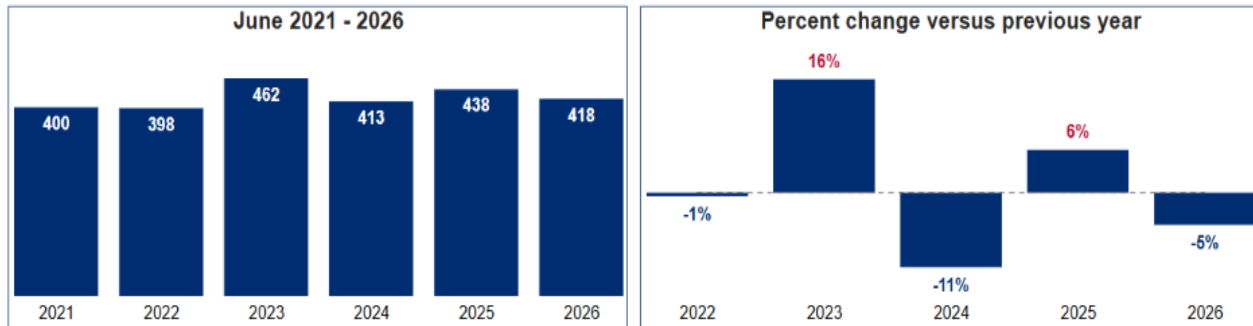

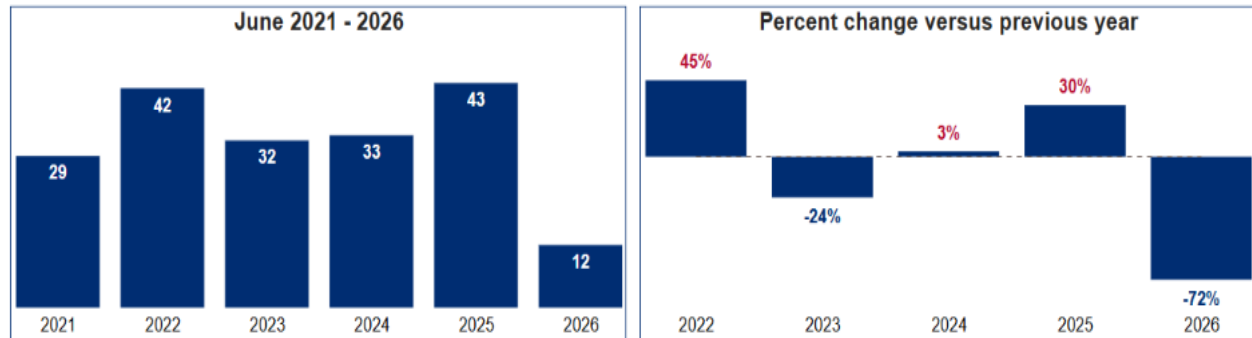

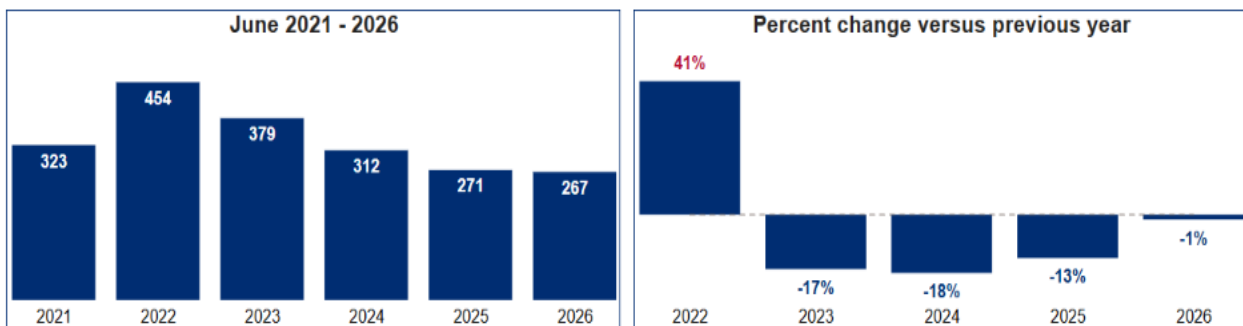

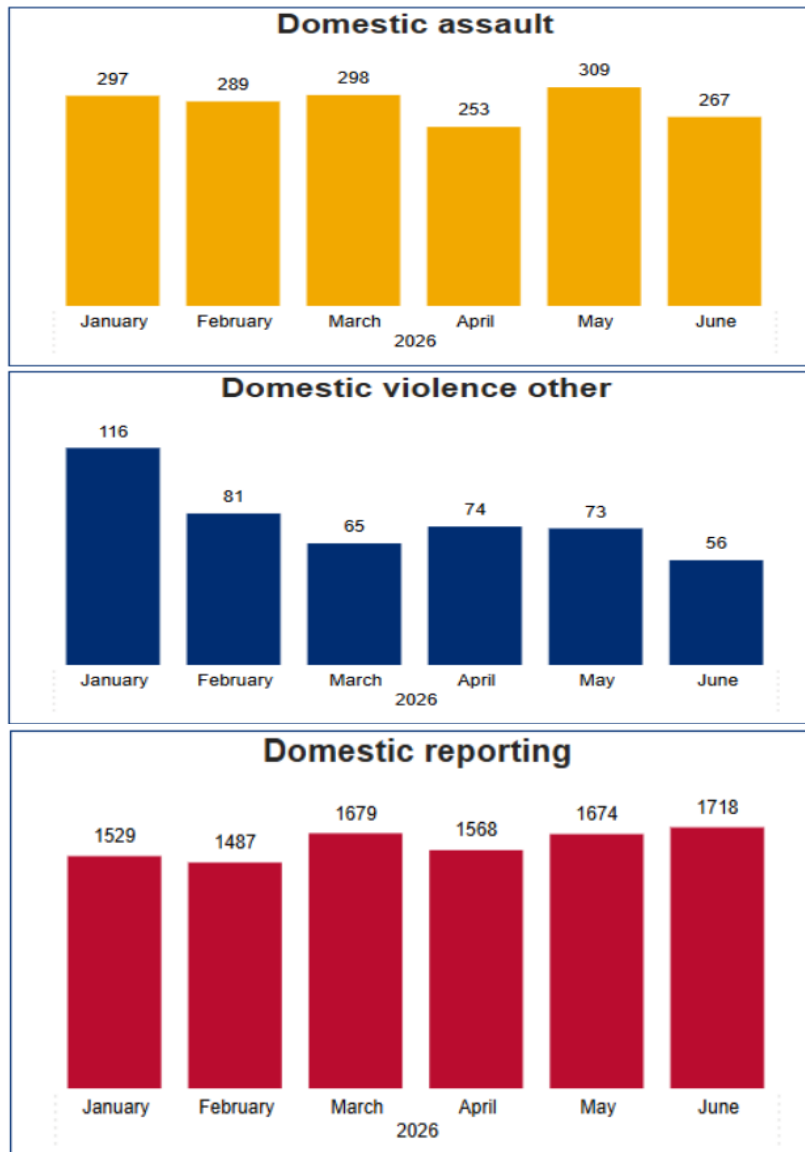

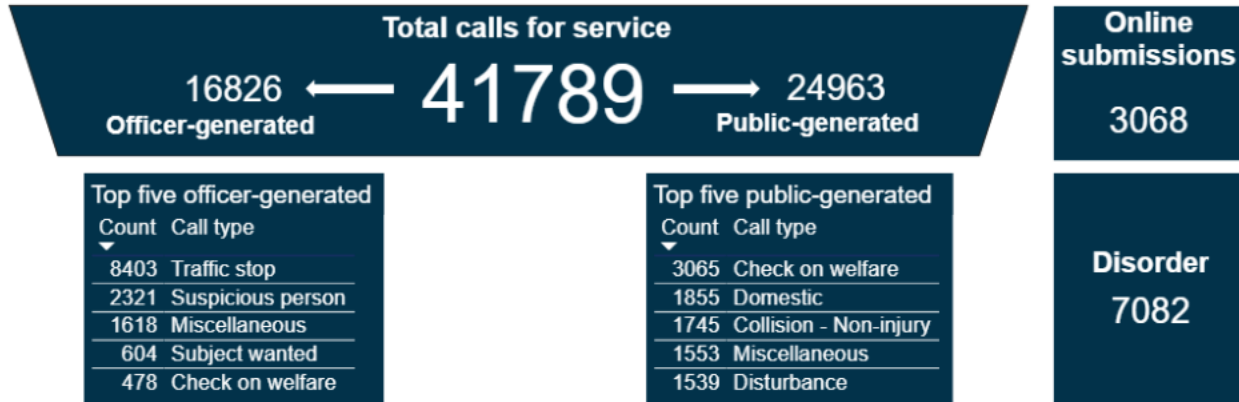

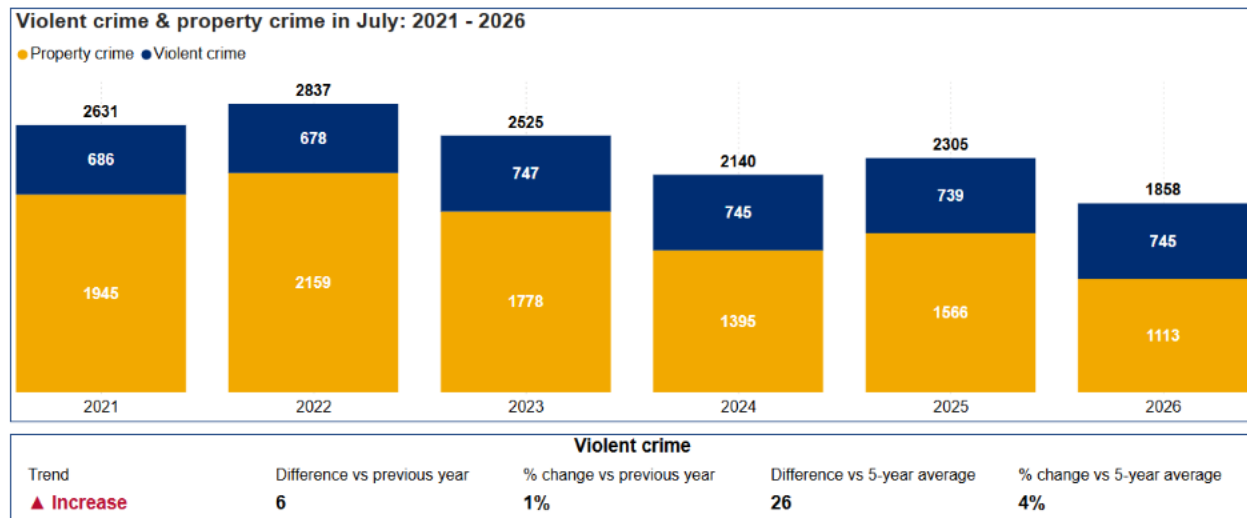

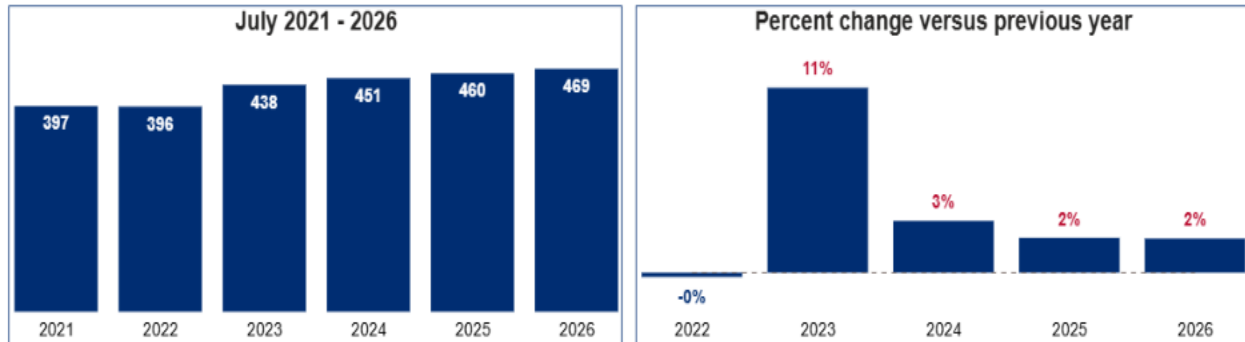

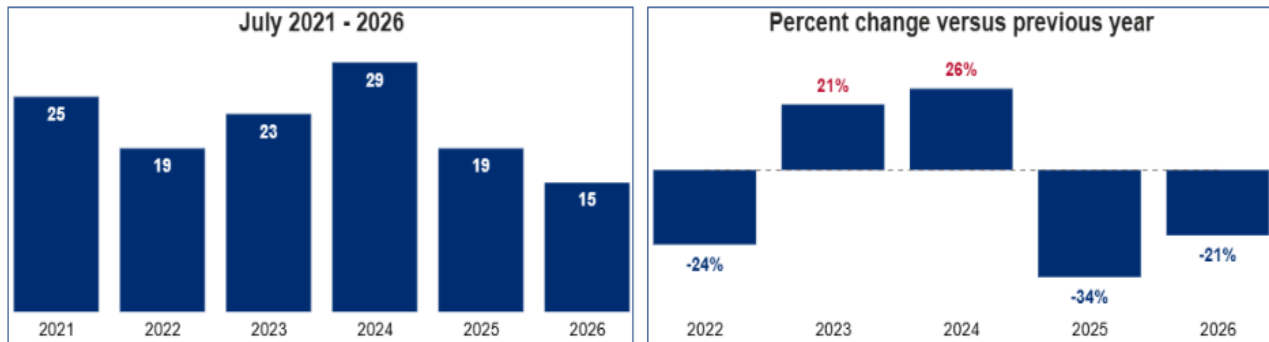

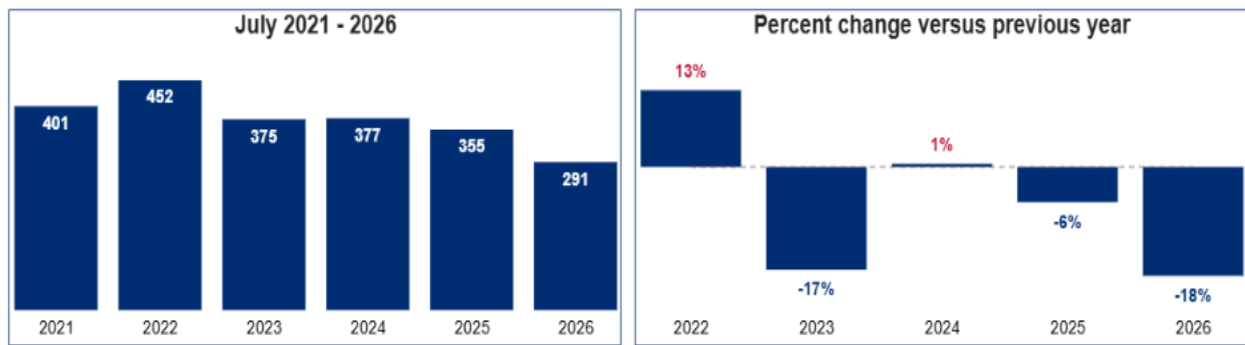

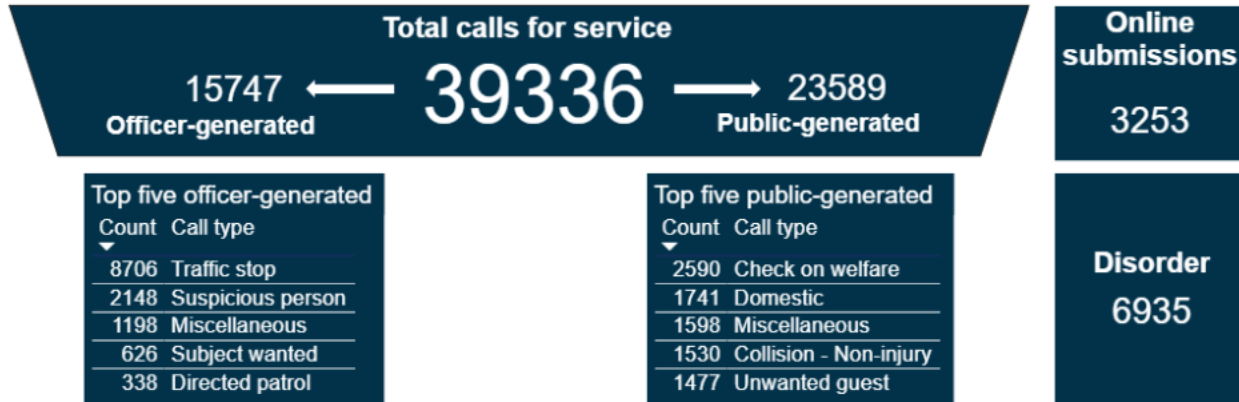

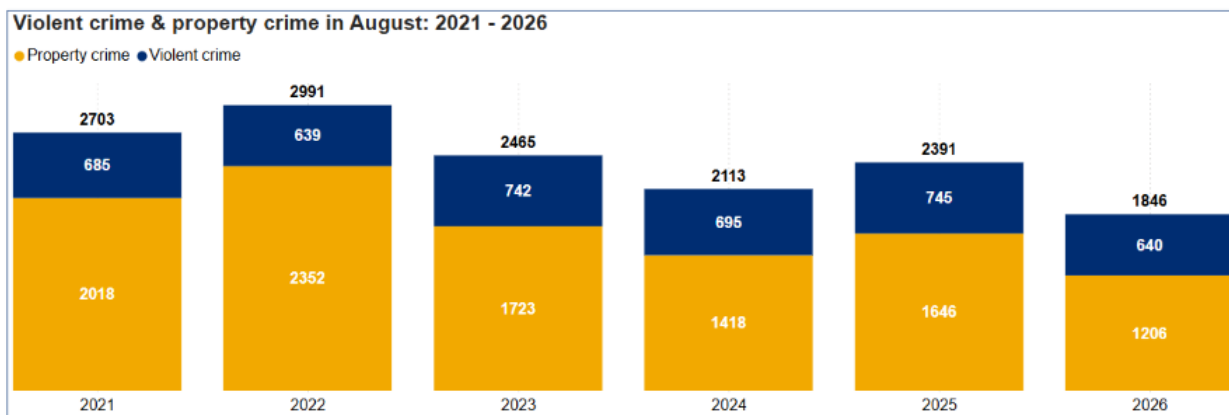

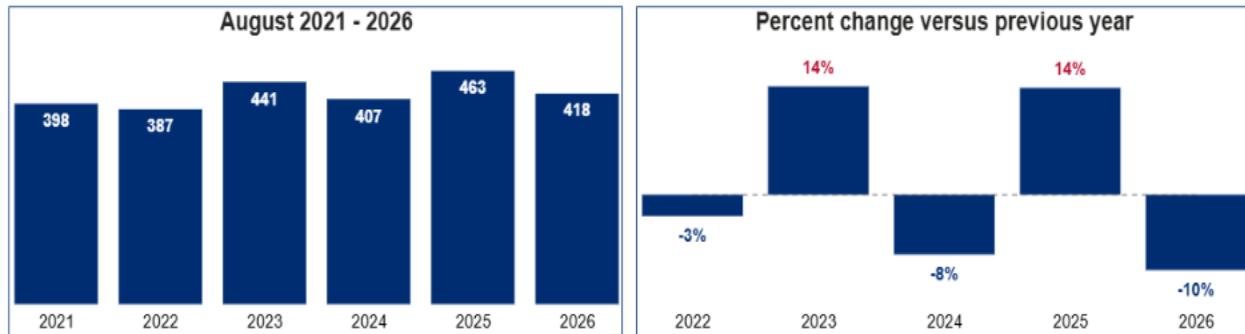

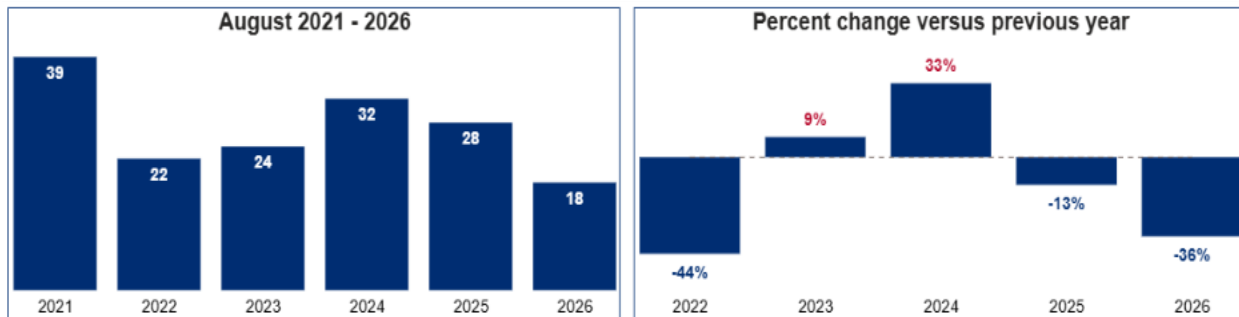

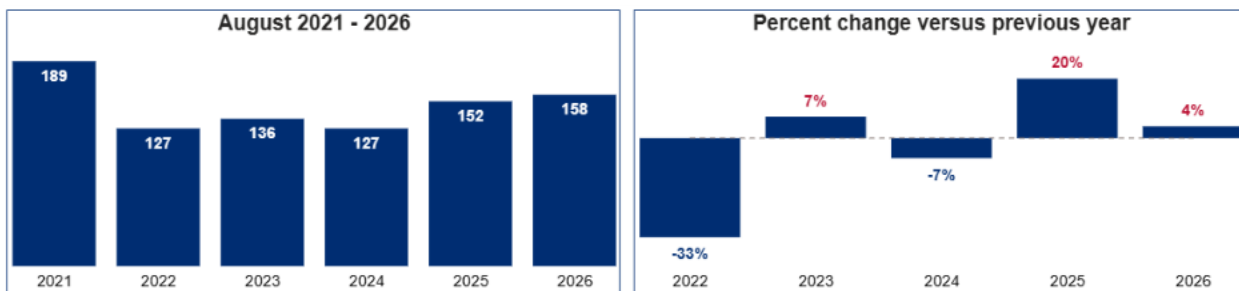
